#### **Minutes**

#### Welcome

#### Juniper Gardens Children's Project

Cornelia introduces Jay Buzhardt and Charles Greenwood to give an overview on the Juniper Gardens Children's Project.

Jay explains the Juniper Gardens Mission is to promote children's social well-being and academic achievement by improving the quality of their care and education using evidence-based practices. Some areas of research include learning and development in young children. Social, behavioral, and academic school success. Improving evaluation and practice in home, classroom, and community settings.

One of Juniper Gardens' projects is the Infant-Toddler Growth to Individualize Services Individual Growth & Development Indicators (IGDIs) which measures a child aged 6-42 months response to intervention over time. The four outcomes targeted are early communication indicator, early movement indicator, early social indicator, and early problem-solving indicators. Nearly 110,000 assessments have been conducted to date, with 23 states participating.

Jay introduces Charles Greenwood who provides an overview of the KC Brain Builders program. The primary goal of this program is to empower families to support their children's learning right from birth.

#### Year at a Glance

Cornelia introduces various State of Kansas Early Childhood agencies to the Panel for agency highlights for the year 2022.

Cornelia presents on behalf of Amanda Petersen and explains that Kansas State
Department of Education aligned Kanas Preschool Pilot & Early Childhood Block Grant
preschool requirements. Continued statewide Ages & Stages Questionnaires (ASQ)
implementation; shared data with the State Interagency Coordination Council (SICC)
Partnered to launch the review and revision of the Kansas Early Learning Standards (KELS)

Cornelia welcomes Nichelle Adams from Kansas Department for Children and Families.

In 2022, many changes were made including increasing the initial income limit for child care assistance to 250% of the federal poverty level from 185%. They also increased the maximum DCF provider rates for all age groups to 85% of the latest market rate survey. From April 20, 2020. – Sept 30, 2022, DCF ran the Hero Relief Program for Essential Employees which is a child care assistance program. Relief funds were also used to purchase access to ECE Shared Resources which is live and contains over 2500 readymade resources for providers. They also have the P-EBT, the emergency water program, Emergency Food Assistance Benefits, Pandemic Emergency Assistance Program.

Cornelia welcomes Jarvis Doleman and Melissa Schoenberger from Kansas Department of Health & Environment.

The Child Care Systems Improvement Team (CCSIT) put 14 recommendations forward, These recommendations are now at various stages of implementation. Surveyor timeliness has continued to improve over the last few months since recovering from closures and the pandemic. Another big achievement for 2022' was the implementation of the Live Scan digital fingerprinting system across Kansas. KDHE was able to announce the introduction of various Live Scan (Digital fingerprinting) stations which will lessen the wait time for providers.

Cornelia gives an overview on behalf of Melissa Rooker of the Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund.

Some of the major accomplishments at KCCTF in 2022' were the development and finalization of the Career Pathway, and progress on the Workforce Registry project. Another big win was expanding the Dolly Parton Imagination Library as state partner and receiving additional funding through the Children's Initiative Fund (CIF).

Cornelia welcomes Kelly Davydov of Child Care Aware of Kansas.

Key accomplishments for Child Care Aware of Kansas in 2022 include expanding the Child Care Health Consultant Network (CCHC), launching the Child Care Quality Improvement & Support (CCQIS) system, child care sustainability grants, expansion of community outreach and engagement community partnership grants, and launching the Child Care GO Team.

Cornelia welcomes Patty Peschel of Kansas Child Care Training Opportunities.

Big accomplishments for KCCTO during 2022' were centered around workforce development. Innovations included expanded course formats and expanded scholarship opportunities for provider accreditation and directors credentials support.

#### Work Group Reports

**Child Care Recruitment & Retention + Quality & Environments –** Spoke about information gathering. Are there any large providers that exist that don't necessarily fall in within the KDHE approved credits. If you have had a meaningful professional development, what made it meaningful? Some type of application with that learning. Where there are gaps within the professional development system and around advocacy for a provider or how they navigate the policy from the backend.

**Family Navigation –** Discussed the career pathway and the registry and all the workforce efforts. What type of information should be shared to families and where to share that. Types of information like education levels, training levels, what kind of experience you have in diverse backgrounds. Talked about leveraging the existing materials for families, such as what should you be asking for in a provider. We don't want to overwhelm families with more information, we just want to have something with more detail to help. How do we meet families where they are. Trying to figure out what the right amount of information is valid in the moment they are in. A lot of materials can be utilized but make sure that everything aligns and its digestible and meaningful for families.

- Eldonna Chesnut shares that she is excited for a new collaboration opportunity with the Family Conservancy.
